MINUTES

Tuesday, October 3, 2023 @ 7 PM Denair Unified School District, Leadership / Board Room 3460 Lester Road Denair, CA 95316

- 1. Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance
 - a. James (Jim) Brugger called the meeting to order at 7:03 PM and led the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 2. Welcome and Roll Call
 - a. Members present: Jim Brugger, Adam Dalton, Judy Kindle, Samuel Paulissian, and Kimberly (Kim) Stokes
 - b. Members absent: none.
- 3. Public Comment
 - a. A community member asked when the Denair MAC webpage would be updated to reflect the new population statistics based on the 2020 census, the new librarian (Colleen Vargas), and the updated name of CSU Stanislaus.
 - b. A community member asked if there is a time limit for yard sales; there are numerous perpetual yard sales throughout town.
 - c. A community member asked about the increased street use of golf carts.
 - d. A community member notified the MAC that Public Works has been contacted to request a traffic study for the intersection of Waring and Monte Vista to evaluate the need for a 4-way stop sign; awaiting results of the traffic study.
 - e. A community member noted emergency responders come from too far away; dispatching issues are causing delays in responding to accidents.
 - f. A community member noted an increasing need for community resources (emergency response, sheriff, etc.) with the increasing population from the incoming developments.

 - a. A motion was made by Sam Paulissian and seconded by Judy Kindle.
 - b. The minutes were unanimously approved.

- b. Valley Water Collaborative Parry Clauson
 - i. non-profit that is implementing the Nitrate Control Program mandated by the Regional Water Board for the Modesto and Turlock groundwater basins.
 - ii. Starting Year 3
 - iii. 460 residents currently receiving bottled water.
 - iv. Funding has been expanded to include uranium, arsenic (50 percent of rural wells are contaminated), and 1,2,3-Trichloropropane (legacy pesticide).
 - v. Long-term solution: bring rural wells onto the public water utility system.
 - vi. Pursuing grants to accomplish this CA agriculture boards, water boards, and department of commerce.
 - vii. Denair to South Turlock testing area 70 percent nitrate exceedances
 - viii. New connection capacity to public utility resident resistance to hook up due to cost.
 - ix. Other option: well head treatment
 - x. \$1.5 million per mile for new drinking water pipeline installations
 - xi. Need to control the sources from dairies, agricultural lands, and cities.
 - xii. Residents can get up to 5-gallon bottle water deliveries instead of individual bottled water; no large tank delivery available yet.
 - xiii. Reverse Osmosis downside: for every 1 gallon of clean water, 7-8 gallons of waste is produced.
 - xiv. Condensate Collection System startup company not holding up agreement for research and development.



What is a Housing Element?

- One of eight elements in the County General Plan
- Housing Element updates required by State law in eight year "cycles."
- Currently preparing the 6th cycle Housing Element update
- Updates done on a schedule prescribed by the State (adoption deadline December 31, 2023)






What does a Housing Element do?

- Provides an assessment of both current and future housing needs
- Identifies opportunities and constraints on housing production
- Establishes goals, policies, and programs to meet housing needs
- Updates County practices and regulations to reflect new State laws

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Housing Element Basics

Housing Element identifies strategies and programs that focus on:


- Conserving and improving existing affordable housing
- Assisting in the provision of affordable housing
- Maximizing housing opportunities throughout the community
- Provide housing choices that serve the needs of special needs populations
- Removing governmental and other constraints to housing investment
- Ensure fair and equal housing opportunities

What happens if the County doesn't update the Housing Element?


- Out of compliance with State Law
- The General Plan could be deemed inadequate and therefore invalid
- A noncompliant or invalid General Plan creates the potential for the County to be sued when making land use decisions
- The County would be ineligible for several Federal and State housing, community development and infrastructure funding and grant programs


